The faith of Sarah

A month ago I started a new series with my Sunday School lessons on Hebrews 11- The Hall of Faith. I'm going through the chapter person by person and writing a lesson based on each one, and I have been really blessed by them. This week's lesson as about Sarah.

In studying Sarah's faith according to Hebrews 11:11-12 it is practically impossible to separate it from her husband, Abraham, because they shared the same faith, and lived the same faith.

God change Abram's name (meaning "Father of many") to Abraham (meaning "Father of a multitude"). At the same time God changes Abraham's wife's name from Sarai (meaning "My princess", ie, first her parents' princess and later Abraham's rincess) to Sarah (meaning "Princess" ie the princess of a new race). In my study it struck me that simply announcing to their household and acquaintances their new names was a real act of

circumstances. Think about it for a moment. The names they already had, especially Abraham's were probably already a sore point for them, for Abraham was the father of one, not many, and Sarah was no-one's mother at all. Now , out of nowhere God changes their manes to Father of a multitude, and Princess of a new race! No doubt an announcement such as this would have left them wide open to scorn and ridicule. And yet with great faith and

courage they did make that announcement, for never again do we read of them being called Abram and Sarai- by anyone. Abraham and Sarah believed that God would keep His promise, and that the significance of their new names would indeed be fulfilled. Later in Genesis 18, we read that 3 angels came to Abraham's tent and reiterated God's promise that Sarah would bear a son, and that this would happen over the next year(vs 10) Sarah heard if in the tent door, and doubting in her heart, she laughed and said, "After I am waxed old shall I have pleasure, my lord being old also?" (vs12) Then we read in vs 13-15 how that the Lord rebuked her for her lack of faith, and for denying it. However, God does not punish her, and in chapter 21:1-3 we see that God did indeed opened her womb and she conceived. The Bible tells us in Hebrews 11:11 that it was "by faith" that she received strength to conceive, so we see that while Sarah did suffer a lapse of faith, it was only temporary. The Lord's

rebuke, and, no doubt the encouragement of her husband, restored her to a strong faith in God's faithfulness and power. She waited up to a year from the time of the original promise before it was fulfilled in Isaac's birth, and never in that time did she renounced her new name. I was encouraged in three points from Sarah (and Abraham's) story according to Genesis 17-21, Romans 4:16-22 and Hebrews 11:11-12.

A) Faith begins when we disregard our inabilities knowing that god's abilities will more that compensate (Romans 4: 19-20). Both Abraham and Sarah were beyond child-bearing age, but God's power was not limited by their powerlessness. I am reminded that there is nothing too hard for God, and therefore I must trust in Him to do even the impossible (Genesis 18:14).

B) It is not rare for a Christian to have a lapse of faith. Often I lack faith in my own Christian walk. Praise the Lord though, that He does not leave me stumbling. He rebukes me, and maybe

sometimes sends me "an angle" to encourage and restore me again to a strong faith in His promises. When we stumble, we must listen to rebuke and heed encouragement as Sarah did, and like her, we can by God's grace and mercy be forgiven, restored and used to the praise and glory of the Lord.

C) Being fully persuaded that God can and will do what He promises gives us the courage to make a public declaration of the given promise. Neither courage nor faith can exist exclusively of the other. Courage is the natural fruit of faith. Faith without courage is not faith at all, and courage without faith is nothing but vain hope. This truth has for-reaching applications in the Christian life. For example, if we truly believe that God will be faithful and that He is able to fulfil His promise that if a person repents and believes the gospel then God will give her forgiveness and eternal life, or on the other hand, that God can and will keep His promises to punish unbelieving, unrepentant sinner for

eternity in the Lake of Fire,,, -if we really believe that, then we will have the courage to repent and trust Christ and then to publicly confess Him in baptism. Likewise, if we really believe these promised we will have the courage

to publicly declare these same promises by getting involved in soul-winning. I hope everybody who reads this will be as encouraged and challenged as I was by the faith of Sarah.

When the scale of trial is nearly empty, you will always find the scale of consolation in nearly the same condition; and when the scale of trials is full, you will find the scale of consolation just as heavy. When the black clouds gather most, the light is the more brightly revealed to us. When the night lowers and the tempest is coming on, the Heavenly Captain is always closest to His crew. It is a blessed thing, that when we are most cast down, then it is that we are most lifted up by the consolations of the Spirit. One reason is, because trials make more room for consolation. Great hearts

can only be made by great troubles. The spade of trouble digs the reservoir of comfort deeper, and makes more room for consolation. God comes into our heart- He finds it full- He begins to break our comforts and to make it empty; then there is more room for grace. The humbler a man lies, the more comfort he will always have, because he will be more fitted to receive it. Another reason why we are often most happy in our troubles, is this- then we have the closest dealings with God. When the barn is full, man can live without God: when the purse is bursting with gold, we try to do without so much prayer. But once take our gourds away, and we want our God; once cleanse the idols out of the house, then we are compelled to honour Jehovah. 'Out of the depths have I cried unto thee, O Lord,' There is no cry so good as that which comes from the bottom the mountains; no

prayer half so hearty as that which comes up from the depths of the soul, through deep trials and afflictions. Hence they bring us to God, and we are happier; for nearness to God is happiness. Come,

What I'm about to share with you are the very words I've used to encourage

myself. These words have broken the spirit of discouragement. No one is immune to problems. Anyone who attempts anything for God will have problems and will be discouraged.

Today I want to encourage you:

God is greater than you think, closer than you think, He is more ambitious

than you think, more committed than you think.

Satan will attempt to get you to focus on and to magnify the problem rather than to focus on God and to magnify Him.

The Bible says to let the weak say, "I am strong," let the oppressed say, "I am free," and let the sick say, "I am healed."

The Bible says that no weapon formed against you will prosper and that God will never leave you nor forsake you.

It's time to starve your fears and feed your faith by magnifying the Lord rather than that which is discouraging you.

Proverbs 20:24: Man's goings are of the Lord; how can a man then understand his own way?

"Since the Lord is directing our steps, why try to figure out everything that happens along the way?"

Psalm 37:23: "The steps of a good man are ordered by the Lord."

The Bible declares that we can do all things through Christ who strengthens us.
